## Tu B'Shevat **Mystical Seder**

In Deuteronomy (11:13-7) we read that if we obey the commandments we will receive all that we need to have a successful crop harvest. But if we don't, God will "shut up the skies so that there will be no rain and the ground will not yield its produce." The obvious meaning is that if we are good, good things will happen, and if we don't obey the commandments bad things will happen.

Rabbi Isaac Luria, a mystic, believed there was a different explanation for why there is suffering in the world. He taught that things don't always go the way we wish because the world is not yet whole and needs healing. It is up to us to help heal the world.

Mysticism teaches that our potential to affect the world even extends to eating. Certain fruits are categorized by their traits, and are

imbued with symbolism and divine potential. By eating them we can help advance the world towards wholeness and cause holy sparks to ascend to the heaven.



Join us on Friday, January 25, at 6:00 PM to learn about these different fruits and enjoy them at our Tu B'shevat seder. And help to heal the world, even if just a little.

## Chanukah candle lighting 101

One candle is added to the menorah each night. The first night, you light only the shamash (the one at a different height) and one Chanukah candle. By the eighth night, you light all of the candles.

Candles should be added to the menorah from right to left (like Hebrew writing). Light the shamash candle first, then recite the blessings while holding the candle. Do not light the other candles until the blessings are done!

#### **Blessings over Candles**

Baruch atah, Adonai Eloheinu, Melech haolam, asher kid'shanu b'mitzvotav v'tsivanu l'hadlik ner shel Chanukah. Blessed are You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of all, who hallows us with mitzvot, commanding us to kindle the Chanukah lights.

Blessed are You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of all, who performed wonderous deeds for our ancestors in days of old at this season.

#### For the first night only:

Baruch atah, Adonai Eloheinu, Melech haolam, shehecheyanu v'kiy'manu v'higiyanu laz'man hazeh.

Blessed are You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of all, who has kept us alive, sustained us, and brought us to this season.

Lighting the Candles - After reciting the blessings, use the shamash to light the Chanukah candles from left to right (newest to oldest). Candles should be left burning until they go out on their own. They must burn for more than half an hour. Standard Chanukah candles burn for about an hour.

We kindle these lights because of the wondrous deliverance You performed for our ancestors. During these eight days of Chanukah, these lights are sacred; we are not to use them but only to behold them, so that their glow may rouse us to give thanks for Your wondrous acts of deliverance.

## Tu B'Shvat - January 20-21, 2019

**Tu B'Shvat** is first mentioned in the *Mishnah*, the code of Jewish law that dates back to around 200 C.E. There, in *Rosh Hashanah* 1:1, the text speaks of four new years, all of which are connected to an ancient cycle of tithes. Each year, the Israelites were expected to bring one-tenth of their fruits to the Temple in



Jerusalem, where they were offered to God and also helped sustain the priestly class and the poor. Since fruit from one year could not be used to tithe for another, the Rabbis had to determine when a crop year would begin and end. They chose the month of Sh'vat as the cut-off date, for this is when, in Israel, the sap begins to run and the trees start to awaken from their winter slumber, before beginning to bear fruit.

Like Chanukah, Tu B'Shvat is a post-biblical festival instituted by the Rabbis. However, the holiday has biblical roots. The tithing system upon which it is based dates back to the Torah and its deep concern with trees, harvests, and the natural world, all of which are at the heart of Tu B'Shvat. Beginning with the Tree of Knowledge of Good and Evil in the Garden of Eden all the way through to Deuteronomy's injunction against destroying fruit trees in times of war, our biblical text is replete with trees, both literal and metaphorical. Indeed, the Torah itself often is referred to as an eitz chayim (tree of life), based on a passage in the Book of Proverbs.

Although the celebration of Tu B'Shvat has a long and varied history, the theme most commonly ascribed to the holiday today is the environment. It is considered a festival of nature, full of wonder, joy, and thankfulness for God's creation in anticipation of the renewal of the natural world. During this festival, Jews recall the sacred obligation to care for God's world, and the responsibility to share the fruits of God's earth with all.

Tu B'Shvat falls at the beginning of spring in Israel, when the winter rains subside and the pink and white blossoms of the almond trees begin to bud. It is for this reason that almonds and other fruits and nuts native to the Land of Israel - barley, dates, figs, grapes, pomegranates, olives, and wheat - are commonly eaten during the Tu B'Shvat seder.

In modern times, Tu B'Shvat was nourished by the rise of the Zionist movement in the late 19th and early 20th centuries, which re-emphasized the Jewish people's connections to the land and the natural world. It was the Zionist pioneers who - with strong financial support from Jews throughout the world who donated trees to mark *smichot* (special occasions) - re-forested the land of Israel, largely under the auspices of the Jewish National Fund (*Keren Kayemet l'Yisrael*). As a result of this emphasis on tree planting - on Tu B'Shvat and all year long - Israel stands as the only country in the world with an almost constant net *growth* of trees.

**Tu B'Shvat Seder:** With the revival of Jewish mysticism—*kabbalab*—in the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries, Tu B'Shvat received renewed attention and importance. The kabbalists created a special ritual, modeled after the Passover seder, which celebrated God's presence in the natural world. As the rituals and readings for the Tu B'Shvat seder developed, they were eventually collected into a book, *Pri Etz Hadar, (The Fruit of the Goodly Tree)*, which was published in 1753.

The Tu B'Shvat seder, full of imagery and symbolism, is divided into four sections that represent the four seasons. This seder also is divided into four mystical "spheres," each of which represents a different relationship between humans and the earth: Assiya (Actualization), Yetzira (Formation), Beriah (Creation), and Atzilut (Nobility).

As with the Passover seder, the Tu B'Shvat seder evolved to include four cups of wine or grape juice, but in varying shades of red, which represent the seasons: white for the bleak time of winter, white with a bit of red to represent the earth's awakening in early spring, red with a bit of white representing the blossoming of late spring, and dark red to represent the fullness of all the growing plants and vegetation along with the heat of summer.

Many of our contemporary Tu B'Shvat *haggadot* (texts that set forth the order of the seder) draw on its rituals. Often we group the fruits into three types: fruits with tough outer shells and edible interiors (melons, peanuts, pomegranates, coconuts, citrus, etc), fruits with edible exteriors and inedible pits (dates, olives, plums, peaches, apples, etc) and fruits that are entirely edible (berries, figs, grapes, etc). These are said to represent different seasons and/or ways of being in the world, often following kabbalistic categories.

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
