The Wisdom and Agelessness of the Sages

During the Fall semester we studied various *mishnaot* (verses) from *Pirkei Avot*. This is an ancient text that was written by the Rabbis of the Mishnah, guiding us how to live an ethical and moral life. It is amazing that such ancient words can continue to be relevant for us today and stimulate such interesting discussions. In the Spring we will be continuing in the book we are using, *Pirkei Avot: A Social Justice Commentary*. Join us for classes. Registration forms are available in the Harbinger, on the temple website, and in the temple office. No previous experience or knowledge is needed. Classes begin March 3, 2020.

Here are some of the most powerful verses we studied and discussed.

Pirkei Avot 1:3 Don't be like servants who serve their Master for the sake of receiving a reward. Instead be like the servants who serve their Master with the understanding that they will not receive a reward. And let the awe of heaven be upon you. (The Master they are talking about is God and the actions they are referring to are doing mitzvot.)

Pirkei Avot 1:10 Love work, despise positions of authority; and do not become overly comfortable with the authorities. (Even 2000 years ago, the rabbis understood that power could corrupt.)

Pirkei Avot 1:12 Be a disciple of Aaron, loving peace and pursuing peace, loving people and bringing them closer to the Torah. (Our people has always and continues to teach us the importance of working towards peace.)

Pirkei Avot 1:14 Hillel used to say, If I am not for myself, who will be for me? And if I am only for myself, what am I? And if not now, when? (Finding the balance between self-care and helping others, and procrastination, were problems back then, and continue to challenge us today.)

1. Pirke Avot: A Social Justice Commentary by Rabbi Shmuly Yankowitz

Tuesdays, Noon-1:15 PM 8 classes

Pirkei Avot stands out among the sixty-three tractates of the Mishnah as the Jewish text devoted to ethical advice and guidance. Rabbi Shmly Yanklowitz takes these ancient texts and brings them to life for our modern world. Ordained at Yeshivat Chovevei Torah, Rabbi Yanklowitz received an M.A. in leadership and psychology at Harvard and another M.A. in Jewish philosophy from Yeshiva University. He earned his doctorate at Columbia University. Rabbi Yanklowitz has drawn on a breathtaking number of sources and persons as well as his own personal experiences in composing his commentary. Commentators ancient and modern, men and women, Jew and gentile, as well as insights and anecdotes drawn from his own life and a variety of academic disciplines are all in conversation with one another in this pathbreaking commentary on this traditional text. Rabbi Yanklowitz also does not shy away from dealing with difficult passages that are at odds with a modern sensibility. This book can be purchased from Amazon.com.

2. Shtisel – The Hit Israeli TV Series

Tuesdays, 1:30-2:45 PM 8 classes

Debuting in Israel in 2013, the show won immediate attention. This satirical drama follows the concerns of a Haredi (ultra-orthodox) Jewish family living in Israel. Filmed in Jerusalem, the show brings us physically into Israeli life in this magical but every-day city. As we get to know them we learn how each family member explores their own path through the joys and challenges of being part of the orthodox community in a modern society. The characters are fascinating and unique, and challenge us to understand the world they live in. You can't help but fall in love with their stories as they experience life. The show is in Hebrew and Yiddish with English subtitles. We will watch one show each class and then take time to discuss what we observed. We watched the first 8 episodes during the Fall semester. For the Spring we will continue with Season 1 Episode 9 through Season 2 Episode 4.

(The class will continue in Fall 2020 with the additional episodes of season 2. If you were not with us during the Fall 2019 semester you can catch up by watching those episodes on Netflix.)

Bringing Your Tu B'Shevat Seder Home

The Pesach seder is the single most observed tradition by Jews all over the world. Four cups of wine puts everyone in a great mood. Reading the Haggadah and participating in discussion about the Exodus as well as about "related" topics, from feminism to chocolate, flow easily.

But did you know that there is an opportunity to celebrate a different seder about two months earlier? We still get to enjoy four cups of wine, but the discussion weaves around an entirely different topic. This seder occurs on the 15th day of the Hebrew month of *Shevat*, which translates as Tu B'Shevat. The holiday is also called Rosh HaShanah La'llanot, which means the **New Year of the Trees**. In Israel, the day is observed as an ecological awareness day. Trees are planted and a special Seder is observed.

A highlight of the seder is seeing and tasting the interesting and sometimes exotic array of fruits and nuts assembled on the seder plate. The four cups of wine represent the four seasons of the year: Spring is represented by all white wine, winter is represented by pink wine (achieved by mixing white with a little red), summer is represented by light red wine, and fall is represented by all red wine. The foods eaten are fruits and nuts of three different kinds: those that have hard outer shells with edible insides (almonds, bananas, citrus, pomegranates, pistachios, and carob); those that have inedible pits (olives, dates, peaches, and plums); and those that are entirely edible (figs, seedless grapes, and strawberries).

Following the devastating fires in Israel, Southern California, and Australia, it is appropriate that we celebrate Tu B'Shevat by discussing trees and ecology. In addition, the family seder may encourage the purchase of trees to be planted in Israel.



Introduction

Tu B'Shevat is the Jewish New Year for trees. Leviticus 19:23-25 outlines the importance of Tu B'Shevat, stating:

When you enter the land and plant any kind of fruit tree, regard its fruit as forbidden. For three years you are to consider it forbidden; it must not be eaten. In the fourth year all its fruit will be holy, an offering of praise to the LORD. But in the fifth year you may eat its fruit. In this way your harvest will be increased.

Tu B'Shevat became an important marker of time so Jews could respect the laws of tithing. It was a way to honor the trees, and by extension, the Earth that God gave us. Tu B'Shevat was a way to revere the partnership between humans and nature. By medieval times, the mystical Kabbalists viewed this holiday as a way of spiritual improvement. In line with their general concern for Tikkun Olam – spiritually repairing the world –Kabbalists regarded eating a variety of fruits on Tu B'Shevat as a way of improving themselves.

Now, the environment is changing, and the idea of Tikkun Olam is changing with it. As it says in Deuteronomy 20:19, "A human is like a tree of the field." One human, like one tree, cannot make up a community. It takes all of us working together to repair the spiritual and physical damage humans have impressed upon the Earth. As we celebrate this holiday and eat the traditional foods, we must also think about our responsibility to the Earth and how to begin these repairs.

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
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
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












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RABBI MEDWIN'S SCHEDULE
