From the Rabbi...

High Holy Days in the Time of COVID-19

The High Holy Days are a time of personal reflection, remembering, renewal,

prayer, singing, and being reunited as a community. We look forward to getting together each year, and seeing each other again, and offering a "Shanah Tovah," a good year, with kisses, hugs and handshakes. We yearn for routine and familiarity. Yet, this year we are confronted with a major — deciding between routine and familiarity or safety. In the time of COVID-19, routine and familiarity will need to take on a new look.

Piknach Nefesh – Saving human life is Judaism's highest mitzvah and even supersedes the commandments regarding the observance of Shabbat. During the past six months we have been living through a worldwide pandemic, witnessing millions of cases of COVID-19 illness and the death of thousands from the virus in our country alone.


As a congregation, we must keep the safety of our members uppermost as we approach the High Holy Days this year. Almost all of us are in a vulnerable age bracket and many have pre-existing conditions that put us at higher risk of serious illness and death. Following the reports of the scientific community, holding services in the Temple Sholom building for an extended period of time would involve all the scenarios in which the virus most likely spreads: a large group, gathering together indoors, speaking and singing. Based on these facts, and consulting with congregations and Jewish leaders throughout the country, we have decided to hold all High Holy Days services this year virtually, through Zoom.

Yes, it will feel different, but different can also be special and meaningful. I have been in constant contact with rabbis throughout the country as we work together to come up with ways to provide a wonderful High Holy Day experience.

Here are some of the things we can do as a Temple Sholom community to enhance our High Holy Day experience this year via Zoom:

1. Zoom services as a spiritual experience

a. As we have done for Shabbat, the services will be a visual t'filah style, consisting of slides that contain the words of the prayers along with images, videos and recordings to enhance the meaning and beauty of the prayers.



- c. If you are not familiar with how to use Zoom, I will have practice sessions on a day to be determined before the High Holy Days. I can guide you on how to get on Zoom and we can talk by phone as you sit at your computer, tablet, or smart phone.
- d. If you do not have a device with a camera, you can also use your phone to call in and listen to the service.
- e. Since it is not practical for the services on Zoom be as long as services in the building, each High Holy Day Zoom service will contain the highlights of that service.
- 2. Curbside High Holy mahzor/prayerbook pick up - Our mahzor contains many beautiful readings that we won't be able to integrate into the Zoom service. To help enhance your own personal High Holy Day experience, we would like you to have these books in hand during the High Holy Day season to look through at your leisure. The books will NOT be needed for the actual services. I will designate a day in early September, to be determined, that I will personal provide you with a mahzor in a safe way. We will both be wearing masks, I will wear gloves, you will stay in your car, and I can put the book in your trunk or back seat. You will be expected to return the books after the High Holy Days. This is for temple members in good standing only. You can also purchase your own Mahzor as a book or on Kindle. Until the High Holy Days, the CCAR Press is offering the public 20% off Mishkan HaNefesh with promo code MHN2020 on ccarpress.org.
- 3. Have a chance to spend time in front of the ark

 Before the High Holy Days begin, you will have an
 opportunity to spend private time before the ark,
 with the Torahs dressed in white. Safety procedures
 will be required including masks, gloves, and one
 family at a time. Details will follow.

4. We invite you to create a High Holy Day atmosphere in your home.

- a. Buy fresh flowers
- b. Have candles, kiddush cup and challah ready for services. We will light candles, say the kiddish and do the motzi together during our evening Zoom services.
- c. Use a white table cloth for dinner.
- d. Virtual holiday dinner Join together with other families via Zoom, Facebook, Skype,

Google Meet (formerly Google Hangouts) etc, for a virtual holiday dinner together.

- e. Dress up in the clothes you would usually wear to temple.
- 5. **Wish everyone a happy new year.** Pre-record a short video of you wishing everyone a Shanah Tovah. Send me the video clip (<u>rabbimedwin@me.com</u>), and I will make a video compilation for all of us to view.
- 6. Yizkor Send a photo to me (<u>rabbimedwin@me.com</u>) of loved ones you will be remembering to be used during the Yizkor service.

Much of this is still in the planning stages, so as we have more information we will let you know via e-mail and snail mail for those who don't have e-mail.

I look forward to spending a very special High Holy Day season with all of you. L'shanah tovah,

White Fragility: Why it is So Hard for White People to Talk About Racism







Mitzvah at Exit 105A

The Adopt-an-Exit program has been operating in New York State since 1996, and Temple Sholom of Monticello was one of the early adopters. The Temple raised money to sponsor Route 17 Exit 105A about 20 years ago and has taken care of it ever since.

What is involved in maintaining an exit? Several times a year, volunteers from Temple Sholom pick up reflective vests and helmets from the New York State Department of Transportation, which manages the program along with the Sullivan County Division of Public Works. Thus suitably equipped, the volunteers drive out to the exit and park on the grass along the curve of the off ramp. They bring their own equipment—long-handled clippers, saws, grabbers, gloves, leaf bags, weeding tools, and bug spray.



There is plenty of work for the volunteers. Thoughtless drivers



litter the sides of the road with bottles and cans, old car parts, broken toys, food wrappers, Styrofoam peanuts, and other unattractive items. The volunteers pick up and haul away trash, trim the bushes, weed the garden, and put in new plants as



the traffic whizzes by. For reward, they get an occasional


honk, thumbs up, wave, or a smile.






